FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Future Organic Farmers

CCOF Foundation offers \$5,000 grants to support higher education and vocational students pursuing

degrees or certificates in organic agriculture. Applicants must demonstrate financial need and a strong interest in and commitment to a career in organic agriculture.

The application period is open until April 18, 2025.

Texas Young Farmer Grant

This program provides dollar-for-dollar matching grant funds to young agricultural producers that are engaged or will be engaged in creating or expanding an agricultural business in Texas. Grant awards range from \$5,000 to \$20,000 and may not be used for capital purchases.

Applications must be received by April 17, 2025.

Kansas Specialty Crop Block Grant

The Kansas Department of Agriculture expects to receive \$330,000 from the USDA to fund projects to enhance the competitiveness of the Kansas specialty crop industry. Applicants may request up to \$100,000 for projects up to three years in length.

Applications are due March 31, 2025.

• Information on Bird Flu and Biosecurity Available Online

Food Animal Concerns Trust (FACT) has posted <u>information on Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza</u> (HPAI), also known as bird flu. FACT notes that it is crucial that farmers take action and personal responsibility to prevent and limit its spread. FACT's web page on the topic discusses how HPAI spreads, how to protect your poultry and other animals from it, and what to do if you suspect bird flu.

• Guide Aids Organic Farmers with Wholesale Pricing

Community Alliance with Family Farmers published <u>The Farmer's Guide to Organic Wholesale</u>
<u>Pricing</u> for organic produce farmers who are pricing crops for wholesale sales. The guide helps farmers understand four different pricing strategies, provides tools to approximate what prices you may reasonably expect in the marketplace for your organic crops, explains how prices are determined in different wholesale relationships, and presents best practices for communicating prices to buyers. • Study Links Slow-Growing Broiler Breeds with More Positive Animal Welfare

University of Arkansas <u>research comparing conventional and slow-growing broiler breeds</u> showed that the slow-growing chickens displayed behaviors more closely associated with positive welfare. In this study, a larger percentage of slow-growing broilers that need up to 12 weeks to reach maturity were observed standing, walking, and preening, while more conventional broilers (raised for six to eight weeks) sat in a lateral posture.

Australian Research Finds Microplastics Contamination in Compost

A study led by Griffith University researchers in Australia found that <u>compost applied to agricultural</u> <u>land contains significant amounts of microplastics</u>. Over time, accumulated microplastics can alter soil structure, limit plant growth, hinder the cycling of nutrients, and disrupt microbial communities, affecting overall farm productivity. In addition, microplastics can further break down into nanoplastics that plants can uptake, meaning that they could find their way into the food chain.
