FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Northeast Agricultural Education Foundation Grants

These grants support nonprofit education and leadership training organizations dedicated to serving the interests of farmers and rural communities in the Northeast. The Foundation makes grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

Applications are due each year by May 1.

New York Farmers Market Resiliency Grant Program

New York Department of Agriculture and Markets has \$1 million available for projects that will help enhance current food system resiliency through farmers markets, including projects aimed at the development and enhancement of farmers market infrastructure, online infrastructure, marketing and outreach efforts, and/or delivery capabilities across the state.

Applications are due May 27, 2025.

Colorado NextGen Ag Leadership Grant Program

This program provides grants to organizations and educational institutions to support educational, training, and leadership development opportunities for Colorado's emerging food and agriculture leaders. Applications are due April 25, 2025.

• Organic Research Hub Collects Resources for Farmers

The Organic Farming Research Foundation has debuted a new <u>Organic Research Hub</u> that collects research summaries, factsheets, guidebooks, webinars, videos, tools, and other resources. The online hub is designed to support organic and transitioning farmers across the United States. Resources are searchable by keyword, region, crop category, production topic, and more. The hub also includes an Organic Extension Directory that helps connect farmers with organic experts in their state or region.

• Cover Crops Help Reduce Soil Carbon Loss to Erosion

A study by Iowa State University ecologist Wenjuan Huang found that cover crops planted in fields between cash crops are an effective way to <u>reduce soil carbon loss to erosion</u>. Researchers found that cover crops were especially effective at preventing soil carbon erosion on steeper slopes. Using a model to predict the impact of planting cover crops globally, the team estimates this would reduce soil carbon erosion by an average of 25% worldwide.

• Symposium Showcases Role of Grazing in Fire Prevention

The Rustici Rangeland Science Symposium showcased the <u>role that targeted grazing can play in fire prevention</u>, reports California Farm Bureau's *Ag Alert*. Dan Macon of UC Cooperative Extension explained how producers can use targeted grazing for vegetation management that achieves fuels reduction. Symposium presenters provided examples of how livestock producers can manage grazing both to improve the fire safety of their own land and to provide a marketable service of fuels management for the broader community, on both private and public lands.

• Research Project on Fertilizer Value of Manure Reports Results

The Value of Manure Project, a multi-year research endeavor led by Cornell University, reported results from in-field trials in 2024. This statewide project evaluates nitrogen (N) and yield benefits of various manure sources and application methods to corn silage and corn grain. In addition to being a valuable nutrient source, manure can improve soil health, enhance nutrient cycling, and build soil organic matter.

• Promote Pollinators by Focusing on Habitat

A blog post from the Xerces Society suggests that the <u>best way to help pollinators</u> might not be getting a beehive. The authors suggest that increasing the number of honeybees could actually do more harm than good, as they compete with native bees, yet are not as effective at pollination, particularly for native plants. Instead of getting a beehive, the authors advise creating pollinator habitat to benefit both honey bees and native bees.
